

















U.S. 2022 Billion-Dollar Weather and Climate Disasters

More than 220 County buildings managed by the Division of Buildings and Grounds in the Department of Public Works (DPW). Portfolio includes 20 large buildings that have more than 3.5 million square feet.



290 bridges greater than 20 feet

• The largest inventory of any county-owned infrastructure in New York State.



1,100 miles of sewers

- 6 water resource recovery facilities (WRRFs)
- 5 excess flow management facilities
- Over 90 pumping stations



1,195 County-owned vehicles managed by the Fleet Division of DPW



1,187 miles of County roads (2,400 lane miles)



Approximately 5,500 (4,400 full time) employees

• Commute approximately 2 million miles per year.



More than 300,000 residents are served by the Social Services programs administered by the County Including Medicaid, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP).




